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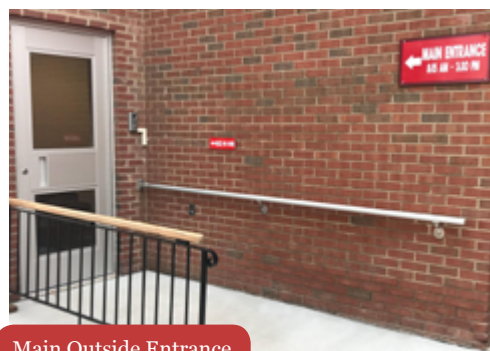


Sport Highlights

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Safety and Security

A priority in the Lakeview School District is to ensure the security of all pupils, staff and visitors.



Main Outside Entrance

Over the summer, the middle/high school main entrance was reconfigured to a single secured point of entry. All visitors upon being granted into the school will wait in the vestibule until the office personnel has granted them access to the main office. Visitors will be required to sign in the visitors' book and wear a visitor's badge. They will be greeted by a staff member and escorted to the desired location. This procedure will also occur at the Oakview Elementary School.

On January 14, 2019, Lakeview will join every school entity across the Commonwealth to initiate the "Safe-2Say Something" program. This life-saving and life-changing safety

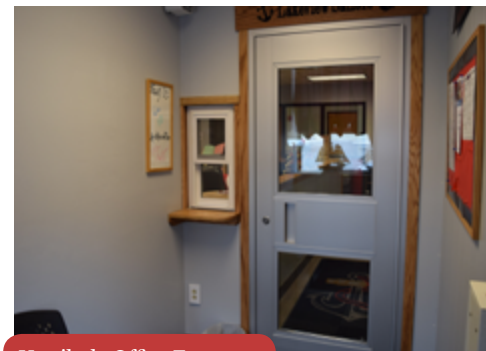
program teaches students, educators and administrators how (1) to recognize the signs and signals of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others and (2) to anonymously report this information to the S2SS app, website or 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline. S2SS works through five easy steps.

1. A tip is submitted via mobile app, website or by calling the PA-based 24/7 Crisis Center
2. The tip is then triaged by the crisis center to gather enough information to act on it.
3. The tip is then delivered to the impacted school and, as needed, local law enforcement.
4. The school and, as needed, local law enforcement access and intervene with the at-risk individual
5. The school then closes out the tip and reports actions taken as a record for their school.

These are just two examples of ways that the Lakeview School District is focusing on the welfare of our students and staff.

Olweus Bullying Prevention Program

As you are aware, our culture is facing many significant challenges. These challenges are not limited to adults, nor are our students immune to them. One of these challenges is bullying behavior and its negative effects on targeted students and bystanders, as well as on those who engage in bullying behaviors.

The Lakeview School District is strengthening its efforts to promote an anti-bullying initiative in our schools, on our athletic fields, on our buses and throughout the Lakeview community. As a district we were awarded a \$9500 Highmark Foundation grant. Our purpose in applying for the grant was to implement a school wide anti bullying program, Olweus.



The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP), a research based and top rated program, is being incorporated into the fabric of our district, as well as many other schools across the country. The goals of OBPP are to reduce bullying problems and prevent new bullying problems from happening. The program also works to make relationships better among students and is intended for all students, not just those who are being bullied or who are bullying others. OBPP components include school, classroom, individual and community level support and well as good communication and support from parents.



This fall, Lakeview Middle-High School and Oakview Elementary held their first annual kick-offs for this program. We invited parents and leaders from many areas of our community to join us as we began the work of creating a culture that does not accept bullying behaviors and makes every effort to help all students feel safe and welcome. We would like to thank Mrs. Jane Buckley of Jane's Stromboli for attending our kickoff program and becoming a Lakeview Bullying Prevention Community Supporter.

Lakeview School District cares about the safety and well-being of our students. We want to make sure our school is a safe place for students to learn and grow. All students participate in classroom level bullying prevention (Sailor Shift) meetings where they learn about the bullying prevention rules, how to safely stand up for others and how to deal with situations that arise, among many other related topics. Students are expected to follow our bullying prevention rules, including: tell an adult at school and

at home if you or someone else is being bullied. It will be very important that adults outside of school take any reports of bullying seriously and communicate information to our school staff. All administrators, faculty and staff members have been trained to deal with bullying situations when we see, suspect or are told of them. Local churches, businesses and organizations are encouraged to contact Mrs. Laurie Snyder, LMHS Academic Principal and Olweus Trainer/Consultant by email at l_snyder@lakeview.k12.pa.us or by calling the Academic office at 724-376-7911, in order to receive a Lakeview Bullying Pre-

vention Poster to display. This will identify your place of business or meeting place as a “safe” spot where students can go for help with a bullying situation outside of the school day. Parents may also contact Mrs. Snyder or one of the other Lakeview Principals for more information or assistance with a bullying issue.

Bullying should not be seen as “kids being kids” or something that students have to endure as a right of passage. Having a safe school experience is something that all students should be able to enjoy. Working together, we can make a “Sailor Shift” that will move us all in the right direction.



LHS Bullying Prevention Rules

1. We will not bully others.

2. We will try to help others who are bullied.

3. We will try to include students who are left out.

4. If we know someone who is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school, and an adult at home.

Additional Support Programs

Lakeview has also placed great effort in providing our students with additional supports and safety nets through preventative programming. As a district we were awarded the Safe Schools Programs grant totaling \$20,000. Through this grant we have been able to implement a district-wide screening tool, the Dessa, as a means to identify students in need of additional supports.

We have also forged a partnership with Rock Creek Wellness as part of our Safe Schools grant. Rock Creek facilitates three resilience groups for some of our 6th, 7th and 8th grade students. We are excited about this partnership.

Utilizing our Title IV funds, Safe and Healthy Students, we will continue to expand our supports to students. As a district we will expand our partnership with Rock

Creek Wellness to provide individual school based counseling to our middle and high school students.



Counseling and Assessment Services will provide school based counseling for our elementary population. Both agencies will work with us as a district as well as families to support our students in need.



Class of 2022 1:1 Chromebook Initiative

The Lakeview School District kicked off its 1:1 Chromebook initiative in October with the Class of 2022. Each freshman student received a Chromebook to use throughout the entire school day and to take home with them to continue their studies outside of school.



The Chromebooks came already outfitted with a sturdy case to protect the devices. This was an exciting day for all involved as it marked the beginning of a new technologically driven era of education for these students and for their teachers.

With the increased accessibility of technology and the integration of Google Classroom in the high school, students can now work on their assignments, study for tests from teacher-posted content, and communicate with their teachers and peers with ease as they strive toward academic excellence.

Everyone is looking forward to exploring the many opportunities that are now available to students and teachers alike as the Lakeview School District

continues to place students first in planning for the future of education in the community.

STEAM Grant

Career and Work exposure and opportunities have also been a focus for the district this year. As a district we were awarded a \$16,000 STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, and Mathematics) Catalyst grant, funded by the Grable and Hillman Foundations.

STEAM encourages a commitment to creativity, contextual thinking, and other aptitudes deemed critical to college and career readiness. The STEAM grant allowed us to start Club 212 for our 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students. Club 212 meets two times a month and exposes students to many different science, technology, engineering, and math stations.

Thus far our weekly atten-



dance at Club 212 has ranged between 85-100 students! In addition to the after school club, we have also been able to purchase various technologies such as 3D printers, spheros, K'Nex, circuit kits, solar lego kits, Cameo Silhouettes and vinyl, MakeDo kits, light boards, Littlebits, and Makey Makey's for our station.



Oakview Happenings

This fall has been an exciting time at Oakview with our Club 212 as an extension of our STEAM program. In early November, our doors were open to over 100 students and their families for our annual Fall Family Fun Night. Students rotated to fun activities, projects and games throughout the building.

Mrs. Nancy Keeling and Mrs. Jen Redfoot presented information to parents about our Title I and OLWEUS anti-bullying program. Most recently, our Christmas programs on December 19 and 20 were well-attended and the performances were very entertaining. Mrs. Kristen Patton is the music teacher.

Lakeview's First Lego League Robotics team, aptly named the Nautical Navigators, competed in the Northwest Pennsylvania Championship Tournament held at Penn State's Behrend campus on Saturday, December 8. Forty-five teams entered the competition, with Lakeview being one of two Mercer County teams, with Sharon being the other local team represented at the tournament.

The tournament is the culmination of four months of preparation. The students not only

design a robot to solve specified task that is connected with a theme, they also have to research a problem and create a presentation on how to solve the problem. Additionally core values such as gracious professionalism are also evaluated.



Nautical Navigators

The Lakeview students did extensive research and traveled to West Virginia to work together on the Challenger Mission and to the Great Lakes Science Center in Cleveland where they met with and interviewed former NASA engineer John Bradshaw. The

students also were able to listen to Astronaut J. Apt in Pittsburgh and interviewed psychologist Jen Johnston. The students tackled the problem on smell in space. Space smells like gunpowder. The students attempted to devise a way to send smells to space to connect astronauts to home such as the smell of fresh cut grass on the first day of spring or pumpkin spice at Thanksgiving. Sending items into space costs \$10,000 per pound, so the students used a lightweight tray with sealed containers. Each astronaut would receive a "Scent from Home" tray with scents that are to be opened on specific dates to create excitement of anticipation. The Lakeview Nautical Navigators placed first with their presentation. They also earned high scores in gracious professionalism and inspiration.

Mercer County Career Center

The Mercer County Career Center continues to provide career and technical education in 14 specific fields for the students in Mercer County. Lakeview High school is currently the largest sending school of the 17 participants, providing 13% (58) of the student population.



Cosmotology

The newest offering at the career center is Computer Information Technology. The program will provide students experience in the administration and support of computer networks, which includes: user and group management, server security, network sharing, operating systems, user and workstation security, help desk support, computer repair and remote access.

The guest speaker this year was retired Air Force Tech Sergeant Chris A. Blakley. Sergeant Blakley, brother of Middle-High school principal David Blakley, is a 1980 graduate of Butler High school and a 1981 graduate of Blair Technical institute. Chris enlisted in the USAF in



1985 and began his air force career in January, 1986 as an F-4 jet engine mechanic and within 3 years moved up to the F-16 fighter jets. In early 1992 Chris became a crew chief with his squadron, responsible for all of the maintenance for his squadron.

During his 20 year tenure with the Air Force Chris was involved in Operation Southern Watch, Operation Desert Storm, Operation Desert Shield, Operation Iraqi Freedom and has served the Air Force at bases in Georgia, South Korea, Panama, Singapore, Italy, Portugal, Germany, Saudia Arabia and the last 8 years of service at the Misawa AFB in Japan.

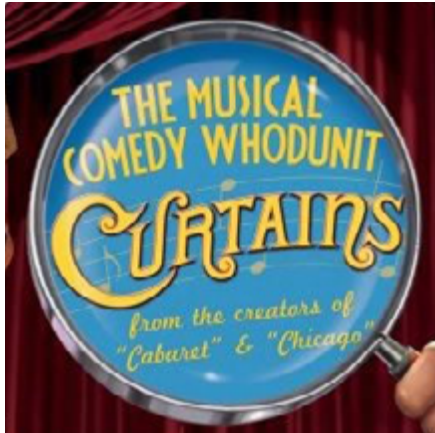

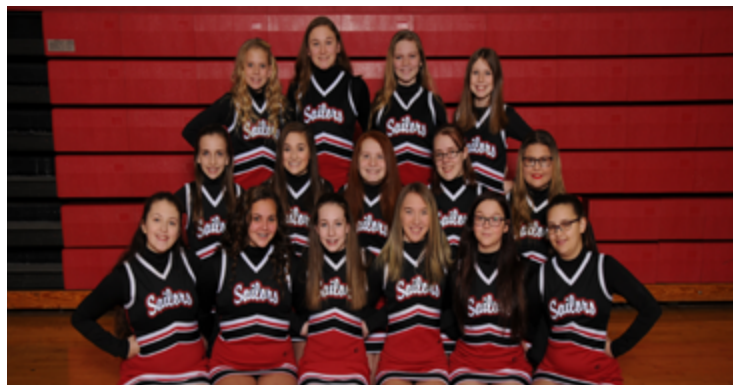
