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"Weathering the Covid-19 Storm- Land Ahoy!"

ear Lakeview Community:
In March of 2020 the Coronavirus came in like a storm and disrupted every bit of normalcy we knew at Lakeview. Our students, families and staff went from attending school every day and experiencing their lives as they normally would to triple duty - working, parenting and studying/teaching from home. By April 1, 2020 an order was issued to suspend classroom and extracurricular functions for the rest of the year in order to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

It is important to note that while the middle/high school and Oakview were closed to students, in no way did education stop. Our administration and faculty worked very hard to prepare for the extended school closure. In many ways, we ramped up the services and offerings to our families. Our Food Services staff began distributing free breakfast and lunch meals to any child under the age of 18 through the end of summer and it still continues today. For this, I am extremely proud of the work of our staff and of the resilience of our families.

When we began the 2020-2021 school year, all students and staff were required to wear masks, maintain social distancing and be very vigilant in adhering to the Department of Health mitigation measures. School board meetings were held remotely. Large group indoor gatherings were placed on hold. While athletic events were cancelled or rescheduled, our Lakeview fans could enjoy the games through a live-stream format. The Homecoming Dance was even held off site. We

continued to persevere.

With support from our technology department, we were able to prepare over 900 devices for students to sign-out for distance learning. Our goal has been to ensure every student has what they need in order to be successful.

Our teachers continue to prepare diligently to educate all students under this new format. Our food service staff is on-site every day, and our custodial/maintenance staff has ensured clean and safe working environments.

Our administration team has been

unwavering in its commitment to lead in a fast, yet effective fashion.

During these trying times, we continue to soar because of the dedicated partnerships between our teachers and families. I again would like to thank all of you and express my gratitude for your work to help and support our children through these uncharted waters.

In the spirit of recognition and looking ahead to the future, we know that our students and families will rise together and come back stronger in 2021-2022 even after all of this. This special newsletter provides a review of the programs and services being delivered during COVID-19. Please keep in mind....land is in sight!

Technology Department

Throughout the pandemic the Lakeview School District technology department provided all students and teachers with equipment for remote learning including chrome books and iPads. We worked to solve connectivity issues by partnering with Armstrong utilities to provide public Wi-Fi access points throughout the community with access points located at fire halls and churches to provide convenient access. We also procured AT&T jet pack Wi-Fi solutions for student homes that did not have an available Internet access provider. Although in the beginning there were many support sessions, we responded to each request to formulate and implement a solution to the issue at hand. Through the use of our Google domain, as our Middle High School learning management system with Chromebooks and I-Pads with the SeaSaw learning management system for younger students, we were and continue to provide all necessary resources for any remote learning students in our district. Other added software suites such as GoGuardian and Securly provide content filtering and management as well as student screen mirroring allowing teachers to track student learning progress and attendance.

This summer we will be investing in many technology upgrades to further reinforce remote and in person education as well as making the school a safer learning environment for the students. Summer projects include the addition of a 75" Promethean interactive touch board with a built in computer for every classroom. These systems allow for content to be displayed for students to view locally and remotely as if the student were seated in the class. The addition of



webcams with microphones allows the teacher two-way interaction with students during asynchronous learning sessions. Other changes coming this summer are a new phone system with enhanced 911 service and outgoing call capacity, upgrades to the 15-year-old Rauland Telecenter paging and clock system, the installation of a 10 Gigabyte fiber optic cable between the Middle High school and Oakview Elementary school to provide increased bandwidth for remote services, and the replacement of several classroom computer labs.

Lakeview Academic Alumni Hall of Fame

The Lakeview Academic Alumni Hall of Fame Committee was pleased to hold a virtual induction ceremony for the 2020 inductees after last year's ceremony had to be postponed. The 2020 inductees were Dr. Mary Ann Craig, Mr. Paul C. Doyle, Ms. Elaine Wilson, and former Lakeview High School teacher Mr. Bernie Davis. This group of inductees have made their mark all over the world and advocated for improving the arts, the civil justice system, and our own community. A theme that was consistent through the speeches was that students shouldn't forget where they came from.

Mary Ann Craig, D.M.E., was a 1965 graduate of Lakeview High School. Dr. Craig received her Doctor of Music Education (1981) and Master of Music Education (1970) degrees from Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. She

was a 1969 graduate of Baldwin-Wallace Conservatory with a B.M.E. degree. Dr. Craig is Professor Emerita and retired Director of Bands at Montclair State University in New Jersey. The Montclair State University Symphonic Band more than tripled in size during the ten years Dr. Craig was Director of Bands at the university. In 2006, Dr. Craig was the first female invited to serve as Guest Conductor of the Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Band Festival in the festival's 59year history. Dr. Craig retired in 2009 and moved back to her native Western Pennsylvania where she became very involved with the Pittsburgh Symphony Association serving as President of the Pittsburgh Symphony Association.

Mr. Paul C. Doyle was a member of the last class of Stoneboro High School, graduating as the 1954 salutato-

rian. During his years at Stoneboro High School, he played varsity basketball and won the Mercer County Voice of Democracy Contest. He was the head lifeguard at Stoneboro Lake during the summers. Mr. Doyle attended Bucknell University on an academic scholarship and then transferred to the University of Florida to be closer to family. He went on to graduate from the University of Tampa in 1958. Mr. Doyle furthered his education at Harvard Law School where he graduated in 1961. The prestigious Jacksonville Law Firm of Jennings, Watts, Clarke, and Hamilton is where Mr. Doyle started his career in public service. He became a partner in this firm in 1967. Paul Doyle is known for consistently improving the civil justice system in Florida where he advocated for the poor and disadvantaged. He led the staff of the Florida Bar Foundation in advocating for justice for the poor. When he retired in June 2009, the Florida Legal Services building in Tallahassee was renamed the Paul Doyle Justice Center for his dedication to public service. He married Shirley Foster in 1957 and they have two daughters, Ami and Lori Ann.


Ms. Elaine L. Wilson was a 1959 graduate of Lakeview High School. She graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 1964 with a degree in Art Education. She went on to further her education at Pennsylvania State University, earning a master's degree in Teaching and Curriculum then Temple University for certification in Supervision and Administration. Ms. Wilson is a former art educator, K-12 Art Supervising Administrator, and was honored as a Pennsylvania Outstanding Art Educator. She is the founder and past Executive Director of the Susquehanna Art Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Elaine has authored and published 18 non-fiction books and is known internationally for her watercolor paintings. In 1988 and 1991, Ms. Wilson coordinated the founding of the first two English language private schools in the USSR as an American and is still actively involved with the schools. She has been a guest lecturer at the American Cultural Center at the US Embassy in Moscow. Along with her many professional accomplishments, she is a ruling elder at the Market Square Presbyterian Church. Ms. Wilson resides in New Cumberland, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Bernie Davis began his teaching career at Lakeview High School in September of 1976. Prior to coming to Lakeview, he was a 1971 graduate of Hopewell High School and 1975 graduate of Geneva College. He participated in both football and track at both schools. Mr. Davis



is known for his loyalty to Lakeview and for putting academic excellence first as a biology teacher. He coached football and track for many years and has been a substitute teacher in the district since his retirement in 2011. Outside of school, Bernie was a member of the Sandy Lake Volunteer Fire Department, Penn State Extension Board, Sandy Lake Wesleyan Church board member and Sunday School teacher, and coach. Bernie and his wife Chris are the proud parents of Lakeview graduates Carrie, Anna, and

attended the French Naval War College. He spent twenty years as a naval aviator and participated in the Grenada, Beirut, Bosnia, and Iraq conflicts. After his retirement from the Navy in 1998, he went on to teach physics and mathematics at Commodore Perry High School for twenty years. While at Commodore Perry, Mr. Briggs served as the athletic director and coached boys' and girls' basketball, girls' volleyball, cross country, and track. Jeff married Cynthia Waybright, also a Lakeview graduate, and they had

The 2021 inductees will be recognized during a ceremony in late May. Both the 2020 and 2021 ceremonies can be viewed by visiting the Lakeview School District website and The inductees are Mr. Jeffrey Briggs, Dr. Jason McCandless, Dr. Cindy McCartney Wetzel, and Honorary Sailor Mr. Taylor Cotton.

Jeffrey Briggs was a 1974 graduate of Lakeview High School. While at Lakeview, he lettered in basketball and baseball and played the trumpet in the band. After graduation, Jeff joined the US Navy and completed nuclear power training as a reactor operator. In 1976 the Secretary of the Navy appointed him to the Naval Academy, graduating in 1980 with a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering degree. While in the Navy, Commander Briggs was sent twice to France with his family where he was an exchange pilot in a French squadron and

four children: Michael, Lindsey, Daniel, and Katherine. All of his children went on to serve their country in the United States Armed Forces. Mr. Briggs is active in competitive pistol and bench rest rifle shooting and plays keyboards at his church.

Jason McCandless was a 1989 graduate of Lakeview High School. After graduation, he attended Grove City College where he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Literature & Communications. Dr. McCandless received a Master of Education in Educational Leadership from the University of Virginia in 2000 and his Ed. D. in Educational Leadership from Boston College in 2002. Jason started his career in education as a high school English teacher at Louisa County High School where he would later become an assistant principal. In 2002, he moved into the role of principal at Lee Middle and High School in Lee, MA. He later became the Superintendent of the Lee Public Schools and Union #29, leading the way in dramati-


cally realigning curriculum. More recently, Dr. McCandless has been the Superintendent of Pittsfield Public Schools and Mt. Greylock Regional School District. He is most known for his collaborative efforts to move school districts forward, building cohesive teams, and "never forgetting (that) he is dealing with people first". In 2016, he was awarded the New England Association of Schools and Colleges Jacob Ludes III Leadership Award. Dr. McCandless sits on the Board of Trustees, Berkshire Financial Services,

American Nurses Credentialing Center and certified by the American Association of Critical Care Nurses (AACN), as an advanced practice critical care nurse (CCNS), and bedside critical care nurse (CCRN). She was in the first 200 nurses in the country to be certified as a heart failure nurse (CHFN) by the American Association of Heart Failure Nurses (AAHFN). 

Taylor Cotton was a 1957 graduate of Keystone Joint High School. He went on to graduate from Clarion University in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science in Education. After his college graduation, Taylor was stationed in Germany while serving in the United States Army. Mr. Cotton began teaching at Lakeview High School in 1968. While at Lakeview, he was the librarian. He actively led the Literary Guild throughout his career and planned trips to places like Philadelphia, Detroit, and New York City for the members. He retired from the Lakeview School District in 1999. Taylor and his late wife, Donna, were married March 28, 1964. They had one son, Taylor Cotton Jr. Together, Taylor and Donna owned and operated a sheep and horse farm as well as a concessions trailer that sold donuts. Athletic Alumni Hall of Fame

The Athletic Hall of Fame Committee is happy to welcome the 4th class of inductees into the Sailor Athletic Hall of Fame. The Class of 2021 include, Mr Tomas Philson, Tom was always active during his time at Lakeview High School, lettering in Football, Baseball and Basketball as a member of the Class of 1970. In football, Tom was a 2nd team "All Tri-County" and in 1969 they tied for "Tri-County Champions". During his senior year, Tom threw for 1011 yards with 14 TD's and ran for 103 yards rushing, and set a punting record with a 72 yard punt. In Baseball Tom was a 4 year letterman. During his senior year he compiled an 18-3 record and pitched back-to-back no hitters and was named the MVP for Lakeview High School. Tom enjoyed MVP honors in both 1969 and 1970. A team captain and 3 year letterman in Basketball, Tom was lead scorer in both his Junior and Senior year with 343 and 371 points finishing his career at LHS with 887 career points and qualified twice for membership in the "300 Club". Tom continued his passion for Lakeview High School basketball by operating the scoreboard for more than 40 years.

Next, Capt. Noah Palicia, "Noah Palicia was as dominating a performer in the sport of Track and Field as any athlete in any sport in Lakeview sports history, His individual and team accomplishments are truly dominating and incredible, especially on the "big stage" said longtime Sailor skipper

Coach Jack Cress.

During his 4 varsity seasons(2004-2007), the Lakeview Boys Track Team earned a 38-8 overall record with 3 runner-up region finishes highlighted by a perfect 13-0 Senior season.

Noah excelled on the big stage by earning state medals in his Sophomore, Junior and Senior seasons. As a Sophomore Noah finished 6th place as a member of the school record 4x800 meter relay group. During his Junior year a 6th place medal in the 800 meter run, and as a Senior, Noah earned an 8th place in the 4x800 meter relay, a 2nd place – State Runner-up, in the 800 meter run in a school record 1:55:11 time, which is still one of the top 10 – 800 meter times in Mercer County history.


Noah owns the fastest 800 meter time ever run on the LHS track 1:58:70, and earned 62 individual dual meet wins and currently holds school records in the 800 meter- 1:55.11, 3200 relay – 8:06.07 and 6400 relay at 19:41.72.


During Noah's Cross Country career (2003-2006) the Sailor cross country team won 3 consecutive region titles with a combined record of 58-7.


Noah went on to attend the US Air Force Academy where he continued to achieve greatness as a pole vaulter clearing 16' and was the WAC Decathlon Champion earning NCAA Division I - All American Honors. Noah's leadership qualities were exemplary and he earned the respect of his teammates and his opponents.



Our third Inductee, Mr. Jonathan Boggs. A Sailor sprinter with the Class of 1991, Jonathan had his mind made up early in 1990 of his desire to run, place and win a medal at the state meet. In 1990, Jonathan won the D10 Championship in the 400 meter dash with a time of 50.61 and went on to win a 3rd place runner-up medal at the State Tournament. 1991 would turn out to be the year for sprinter Jonathan Boggs, finishing as the D10 400 meter dash Champion with a time of 50.21 and participated in the 3200 meter relay team and also earned Championship honors with a time of 8:12.86. Moving on to the state tournament in 1991, Jonathan continued to be the "man to beat" in the 400 meter dash. With the #1 medal around his neck, Jonathan achieved his goal of a state championship with a school record time of 49.46. A record which still stands today, 30 years later. After winning the 400 meter medal, Jonathan went on to compete in the 3200 meter relay and his relay team earned a 2nd place runner-up medal. In reviewing the Lakeview High School Track and Field school record book, Jonathan Boggs is currently ranked #1 in the 400 meter and is a member of the 3200 Relay team that holds 2nd and 7th place in Lakeview High School record book.

Our final inductee is one of our very own, Coach Jack Cress. Mention the name Coach Jack Cress and you hear comments like these, "The winningest coach in Lakeview history in both Cross Country and Track and Field.

He taught me as much as a parent about doing the right thing, in the right way and always thinking about how to make myself better".

"This man is more than a coach, he shows what a true leader and advisor should be to kids in the sports he is coaching or has coached. He showed up every day ready to encourage us

and make us not only better on the field, but better people in real life as well"

"Throughout Jr. High and High School Coach Cress was vital to my development in academics, self confidence, perseverance and work ethic and the list goes on.

Coach consistently allowed me to work through my struggles as an undertalented runner by helping me set achievable goals and allowing me to build confidence that left me feeling accomplished. He saw in me what I could not see.

Coach Cress provided the perfect mix of discipline and lightheartedness to keep me returning year after year. I can honestly say Jack Cress played a huge role in laying the foundation that has ultimately lead to many successes in my adult life."

Coach Cress continues to add wins to his already amazing coaching record here at Lakeview High School. From District 10 Championships, to Elite 8 girls basketball, more than 250 boys track wins, to 284 cross country victories. Including Jack's work as a JV and Varsity assistant and Jr. High coach, he has achieved well over 1000 Sailor victories.

FOOD SERVICES

The Lakeview School District Food Services prepared and distributed 29,337 meals into our local community the spring and summer of COVID 19. For the 20/21 school year thus far the food service department has served 30,169 breakfast and 68022 lunches.

With the extension of the USDA SSO Program through June 30, 2021 and all meals remaining free in the district, participation for breakfast tripled and participation for lunch increased 8%.

The Lakeview Food Service Department will once again be serving meals under the SSO or Seamless Summer Option for the Summer of 2021.

Beginning on Monday, June 7th and continuing through the end of July, the Lakeview School District will be offering a combination breakfast and lunch bags available for pickup on Mondays and Wednesdays from 11am-1pm at the loading dock area outside of the high school cafeteria. Mondays pickups will include 2 breakfast and 2 lunches. Wednesdays bag will include 3 breakfast and 3 lunches.

We will be sending out a mailing next week as well as posting on DOJO and Facebook. Parents must fill out these forms and return back to Darline Wendrock by May 28th. in order to receive meals.

NOW the USDA has extended Seamless Summer Option through June 2022 to support reopened schools for next fall

The National School Lunch Program Seamless Summer Meal Option is extended through June 30, 2022, meaning that schools that choose this option will receive higher-thannormal meal reimbursements for every meal they serve.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture

(USDA) today issued a broad range of flexibilities to allow school meal programs and childcare institutions across the country to return to serving healthy meals in fall 2021 as part of the Biden Administration's commitment to reopen schools safely. Several meal service flexibilities that enable social distancing are now extended through June 30, 2022, including schools nationwide being allowed to serve meals through USDA's National School Lunch Program Seamless Summer Option (SSO), which is typically only avail-

promote social distancing in the cafeteria because they will not need to verify student eligibility for free meals.

USDA said it also will continue to offer targeted meal pattern flexibility and technical assistance as needed. In addition, schools and both child and adult care institutions can continue providing breakfasts, lunches and after-school snacks in nongroup settings at flexible mealtimes. Parents or guardians can also pick up meals for their children when programs are not operating normally, all



able during the summer months. This option not only maintains the nutrition standards of the standard school meal programs, including a strong emphasis on providing fruits and vegetables, fluid milk and whole grains, but schools that choose this option will receive higher-than-normal meal reimbursements for every meal they serve.

Under the waivers, SNA noted, school nutrition programs can maintain grab-and-go meal options and pandemic safety measures and schools can continue curbside meal pick-up services for distance learners as needed. School nutrition staff can also minimize touch points and

while maintaining social distancing consistent with federal recommendations.
